Dear Mr & Mrs Weetch,

It has become my painful duty to write to you just a few lines to let you know that your dear Son Jack has been killed out hear (sic) on the 2/9/18 it is believed that death was instantaneous.

We all suffer the loss of one of our best chums he was beloved by all who knew him for his brave and good natured ways. I hope you will have a letter from our parson who buried him with all his personal belongings. We have been together ever since the war began and I have never had a better chum in all my life I am sure my brother will be cut up verry (sic) much when he hears the sad news as they were always together while at Withypool (sic).

Well dear I know your sorrow as if it was my own people but I (hope) the Lord will look after you both, and all the platoon joins with me in your berievement (sic) for your lost Son.

If ever I come home again I will come and see you as I am no good hand at writing letters.
